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FROM PASTOR ROBERT

Siblings in Christ,

I have been asked the question many times since I became a pastor, "If Jesus hated money so much, why does the church always ask for money?"

The question is derived from passages such as this:

"No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money." Matthew 6:24

While it is my hope that most churches try to uphold this teaching, it does not change the fact that we live in a society where money is required in order to thrive. In several European countries one's church tithe (aka giving) is taken directly out of their paycheck as part of their taxes as long as that individual has declared themselves as a Lutheran, Catholic, Baptist, Anglican, etc... this is not so in the US, therefore we must rely upon the voluntary giving of our individual members. This results in churches often being criticized for talking about money too much or not enough in their attempts to not just grow and gain some measure of success in spreading the Gospel, but also in their attempts to maintain their building and do ministry in the community.

Another issue that Churches face today regarding the topic of money is that many churches have become obsessed with fundraising and/or have abused their positions of power and used money inappropriately. We have congregations that openly tell people that if they give, God will "bless them with riches" promoting what is known as the "Prosperity Gospel" which implies that all people who are "rich" are blessed by God and that one can measure how "blessed" they are by how much money they have. These are often church organizations with pastors who have multimillion dollar mansions, private Jets and giant buildings that sometimes put NFL stadiums to shame. The problem with the "Prosperity Gospel" is that those who practiced this kind of belief system were openly condemned by Jesus in all four of the Gospels.

It is possible for someone with great wealth to be a follower of Jesus, and it is possible for churches with a lot of wealth to do great things, it all depends upon what their priorities are.

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COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

The First Lutheran Church Council met on October 12, 2025. The meeting was called to order by President Rodney Sherpe.

- <u>September 2025 Minutes:</u> The council reviewed the minutes from the September 2025 meeting. It was moved and seconded to approve the minutes. The motion was approved unanimously.
- Treasurer's Report: Jon Vingerud presented the financial report. He reported that as of now, \$30K has been loaned to the general fund this year from reserves to cover lower than anticipated giving. There have been no unusual expenses. It was moved and seconded that the financial report be approved. The motion was approved unanimously.
- Pastor's Report: Pastor Robert reported that the bible study on Christian Nationalism was very successful, with over 20 attendees each week. Many expressed interest in learning more about immigration.

 <u>President's Report:</u> President Rodney stated that one thing that made the Christian Nationalism study so successful was the ability to freely share opinions and discuss topics without worrying about being judged.

Committee Reports:

- Properties: Pastor Robert shared that Properties has been discussing how to change the lights over to LED's now that fluorescent tubes won't be available anymore. They are also looking at what would need to be done to replace thermostats and heating to be able to operate and check remotely.
- ♦ Social Ministries & Outreach: Mike McCoy said there will be a Red Cross blood drive at the church on November 7. Consideration on what to do with the church sign on the corner of 4th and Wyeth is continuing. They are also looking into welcome packets for visitors/new members and new tri-fold brochures.

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COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS—cont.

- Habitat for Humanity: Leslie Wilson that the new home build is happening. She also reported that Habitat is buying back one of their houses and is looking for volunteers to help clean and repair damage.
- Community Meals Cathy Bowcock shared that they have had volunteers to help with dishwashing, media outreach and a website. There will be a turkey dinner on November 25th and a ham dinner in December.
- <u>Social Media</u> Mark Hagelberg (Website) & Pastor Robert (FB). No report.
- ♦ Worship & Music Written report.
- ◆ <u>Fellowship</u> Jessie McClintock reported that she had a lot of positive feedback from the Ecumenical picnic in September.
- <u>Christian Education</u>—President Rodney stated he spoke to Katie Garman and reminded her that we have funds available for her use for Christian Education.
- <u>Mutual Ministry</u>—Pastor Robert stated that a meeting has been scheduled.

Old Business:

For "second offering", the following activities are planned:

Peanut butter drive for the Backpack Program is currently ongoing and a toiletry drive is planned for Advent season.

New Business:

- Habitat for Humanity's request to have members provide a blessing and sign the framing walls of the new house was discussed. Pastor Robert suggest that Reformation Sunday, October 26th, may be a good time for that.
- The Stewardship campaign is coming up in November. Pastor Robert put out a call for volunteers to provide a "Temple Talk" that shares people's insights and journeys regarding giving to the church.



FLC RECIPE CORNER

TThis month the recipe is from Geri Logan.

This recipe was given to my mother by our beloved neighbor Ruby Collis. It is a family favorite for sure and so easy to make.

RUBY'S COBBLER

Batter:

2 ½ Cups fruit (berries work really well, but other fruit can be used)

1/4 cup butter 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 tsp. vanilla

½ Cup sugar

1/2 cup milk

½ teaspoon cinnamon

1 cup flour 1/4 tsp. salt

Combine the fruit, sugar and cinnamon in a bowl and set aside.

2 tsps. Baking powder

Beat sugar and butter together until light & fluffy. Add milk and vanilla and beat until well mixed. Combine flour, salt and baking powder together and add to mixture, beat well.

Pour the cake batter into an 8 or 9 inch square baking dish. Add the fruit mixture on top, then pour one cup of boiling water over the top.

Bake in a 375 degree oven for 40-45 minutes. This recipe can be doubled and put into a 13x9 inch baking dish.
