# PASTOR ROBERT NEUBERT'S BIO

My life experience prior to and during seminary has given me unique perspective regarding ministry. Before seminary I worked as a bartender for eight years while attending an urban Lutheran church in downtown Portland. During my years behind the bar I met and talked with people from all walks of life. I spent many hours with individuals whose lives were spiraling downward and, during this time many regular customers, colleagues and friends passed away or suffered deep grievous losses forcing me to take on the role of counselor and sounding board. I also found myself helping people through relationship difficulties and various other transition periods in their lives. These experiences taught me a lot about the various difficulties that people go through during their life and the different ways people learn to cope with those problems. It also taught me about the effects and dangers associated with drug and alcohol addiction and how these addictions effect the way people perceive the world.

The first Summer after starting seminary I did my CPE (Clinical Pastoral Education) at York Hospital in York, Pennsylvania. This was the trauma center for most of central Pennsylvania and as a result we had an extremely busy trauma bay. Every Chaplain (including the students) was required to pull an all-nighter at the hospital every ten days. It was during these shifts that we all received crash courses in how to council people during emergencies, and due to the volume of people that came through the trauma bay we were given ample opportunities to learn.

This experience proved invaluable a few years later while serving in my first pastoral call in Sharon, WI as I had to council family members, firefighters and students following the suicide of a fourteen year old boy, as well as five other suicides that the community endured during my first two years of Parish ministry. Before completing seminary my family moved to Salt Lake City while there I began working at a group home for autistic boys. The home housed three boys all needing one on one care and each experiencing different levels of autism. While teaching me the challenges that families and individuals face in regards to autism this experience also taught me a lot about patience. Even though I only worked there for eight months I was quickly promoted to assistant manager of the group home and participated in program development for each of the boys, devised nutritional programs, and helped train others in how to provide care. My experience with these young men taught me a lot about patience and the different ways people think and process information.

Following my work at the group home I did my internship at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Roy, UT where I was blessed with a very active and supportive congregation. I learned what it was like to do Lutheran ministry in a culture that is dominated by the LDS church. The overwhelming presence of the LDS church in Utah provides a unique experience for anyone attempting to do ministry in this area. As a result people have a genuine thirst for knowledge regarding the faith so that they can understand what separates them from the dominant culture. Unfortunately all the positive energy I experienced at Our Savior's turned very negative when half of the congregation rejected the 2009 Churchwide decision to allow for the ordination of LGBTQIA+ people currently in same sex partnerships. This happened just as I was finishing with my internship and had recently agreed to stay on as a Youth Director. The current pastor at the time wanted to lead the congregation out of the ELCA while another faction in the congregation wanted to stay. This initiated a desire for those wishing to stay in the ELCA to try and call me as their pastor, though I declined. All of this would provide me with valuable experiences in dealing with congregational conflicts helping to better prepare me for the challenges of being a pastor that have helped immensely over the years.

My first call was in Sharon, WI and I quickly learned about the joys and challenges of being a "pastor of the community". Being the only full-time Pastor in the town of Sharon I was everyone's pastor, whether or not they came to church. This taught me the power of community and the connections we share with those beyond our walls. Because I was the only full-time pastor in Sharon I often found myself working with the local Police department and Fire Department, especially in the wake of local tragedies. This inspired me to become a volunteer chaplain with Sun Prairie police, fire and ems in my next call where I worked with seven other chaplains from several different denominations to serve our local community.

When I first started at Burke, seven years ago, the congregation was in a lot of pain. A pastor had recently been fired from their position after only serving 18 months (this had also happened at my previous call in Sharon), they had to fire their youth director due to a lack of funds and it had recently been discovered that the cause for their lack of funding was that the secretary had embezzled over forty thousand dollars (not including the loose cash that had also gone missing from the offering). All of these things resulted in the community losing many of its members, particularly most of their young families, thus causing a huge dip in their available resources and finances. Consequently, the first few years of my time spent at Burke

was centered around healing and the conflict that erupted followed the events listed above. There was a lot of anger in the congregation and unfortunately there were several people who were feeding that anger and making things even worse. After several sit-down sessions with various members and helping people recognize their joint love for this congregation we were able to move forward and begin to grow in faith and love as a community.

Once we were able to move forward and begin healing, work began on a massive building project starting in the summer of 2019. It began with the construction of a new office wing and fellowship hall in the field northwest of the current building. In March of 2020 the new wing was completed and we moved into it while work began demolishing the old addition that included an office wing and fellowship hall. Then the Pandemic hit and everything went online and construction continued. Once the old addition had been torn down work began preparing the 1899 sanctuary to move and attach it to the new wing. Over the summer of 2020 the Sanctuary was moved approximately 200 yards over the top our cemetery in order to connect it to our new addition. In April 2021 construction was finally complete and we were once again able to use our sanctuary (in a limited capacity due to the ongoing pandemic). Due to the construction project, and the last year and a half of living under the shadow of the Pandemic, ministry was very unique at Burke since for most of that time we didn't have a building to return to. I left Burke at the end of December of 2021 and while we still had many restrictions in place in accordance to local guidelines based upon CDC restrictions ministry was going very well and there was a deeply hopeful spirit at work within the community as it was entering into this new period in the life of this small congregation.

During the month of January 2022 my family and I moved to Hillsboro, OR where we are currently renting a home. On February 1st my wife started a new position running the Oregon State Newborn Screening Laboratory. On March 1st I began my ministry at Gethsemene Lutheran church where I helped them complete their interim process after the previous interim left due to conflict with some of the members. Part of this process included the congregation also hiring a consultant who I worked alongside to help the congregation better handle some of the conflicts that they had ignored and allowed to fester over several years. We did this through congregational meetings, meeting with members one on one and most importantly helping the leaders understand their roles and how to be strong and effective leaders in their community. It is my belief that over the seven months that I served Gethsemene they did a lot of soul searching as a community putting them in a much better place to support and love their next called pastor.

In October of 2022 I began my interim position with Prince of Life Lutheran Church in Oregon City. Thankfully this has been a rather smooth ride. My family and I were welcomed by the congregation and we used these past sixteen months to discern who they are now that they lost their beloved pastor of over twenty two years, and who they wish to be moving forward. Similar to 1st Lutheran we spent the past 16 months meeting in small and large groups discerning where the energy was with the congregation and figuring out what our priorities were moving forward. I will deeply miss the people of Prince of Life but I am very excited to begin a new chapter serving the people of First Lutheran.


#### FROM PASTOR ALLISON'S DESK


Happy New Year, people of First Lutheran! It has been so wonderful to celebrate this special Christmas season with you.

# Joint Service of Music & Prayer Luncheon to Follow


Saturday, Jan. 20, 11 am, First Lutheran
